I. MEETING OPENED

Chairman Henning called to order the regular meeting of the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District's Board of Fire Commissioners meeting at 5:30pm., on January 8, 2019 at Administrative Headquarters. Present were Commissioners Henning, Page, Cottiers, Gerrity, and Stedman. Executive Staff in attendance: Fire Chief Kingman Schuldt, Deputy Chiefs Martin, and McLaughlin, and Director Bishop. Staff in attendance: Suanne Woeste and Nicole Chesser. Public in attendance: Kevin Nelmes, Chris Tobin, Matt Trent, Jeremy Morgan, George Danz, Jim Overman, Annette K., Chris Thornton, Jim Burke, Steve Gifford, Jay Roth, Justin Beasley, Khris Klock, Sal D'Angelo and Jarett Cotter. Others were in attendance but did not sign in.

A. Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation

Chairman Henning opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance followed by the invocation by Commissioner Gerrity.

B. Line of Duty Deaths Reading and Moment of Silence

Chief Schuldt reported there were a total of 3 firefighter fatalities for the month of December, bringing the total for 2018 to 83, followed by a moment of silence.

C. Approval, Additions and Deletions to the Agenda

Commissioner Stedman moved to approve the Agenda as presented. Commissioner Page seconded. Motion passed 5-0.

D. Approval of the GNFD Board Minutes for December 8, 2018

Commissioner Gerrity moved to approve the December 8, 2018 minutes as presented. Commissioner Cottiers seconded the motion. Chairman Henning requested his statement under Agenda I, be corrected to read ..."announce the *termination* of the..." Commissioner Gerrity amended his motion to include correction. Commissioner Cottiers seconded. Motion passed 5-0.

G. Fire Chief's Report

Chief Schuldt presented report as submitted and added the following:

• Thank you to staff and community members who helped make GNFF's 2018 Toy Command a success. A record number of children (over 1,100) in Collier County were provided with gifts for the Holiday Season.



- 14 new firefighters (5 full time and 9 part-time) started employment with GNFD 1/7/2019. Orientation training is anticipated to take four weeks with a transition to shift anticipated in mid-February.
- Congratulations to new Local 2396 Union President Kevin Nelmes and Vice President Joey Brown. The District and new Union Leadership has already met to discuss a pathway to enhanced labor management cooperation.

H. Chapter 175 Firefighters' Pension Plan No Report Presented

I. Local 2396 Report – President Kevin Nelmes

- Immediately after election, steps were taken to move forward as a Union and to transitions Leadership. We will be growing some committees and reformulating other with the true intent to move forward.
- Looking forward to working with management and available to meet with the Chief individually to ensure a pathway to enhanced labor management cooperation.

II. OLD BUSINESS

A. Emergency Services Task Force Merger Presentation – Deputy Chief Martin

- Chief Schuldt presented the background information on Greater Naples Fire District (GNFD) movement towards a merger with North Collier Fire District (NCFD). Most recently the Emergency Service Task Force requested a merger update from the GNFD and NCFD fire districts staff. A PowerPoint presentation with an overview was presented at the December 2018 ESTF meeting.
- Deputy Chief Martin and NCFD's Director D'Angelo presented the PowerPoint presentation from the December 2018 ESTF meeting. NCFD will also see the presentation at their January BOFC meeting.
- Commissioner Gerrity stated we need to give staff direction. Does the Board want to continue working towards a consolidation with NCFD or not?
- Commissioner Page stated we need to pursue the Ochopee District merger ahead of anything we do with NCFD. After unsuccessfully trying to meet with NCFD, he'd like to wait and see how they address the question of having a referendum ready for 2020/2022. Commissioners Stedman and Cottiers agreed.
- Chairman Henning stated next meeting we should have a formal vote to give staff direction to work on Ochopee merger or continue working with ESTF and NCFD.

B. Attorney Request – Rey Velazquez *Time Specific 6:00pm*

Director Bishop advised District's Counsel Rey Velazquez is on the phone. Attorney Velazquez stated pursuant to section 286.011(8) Florida Statutes, I am advising the governing Board that I desire advice, regarding settlement negotiations strategy in the matter of Christian Tobin, Matthew Trent, Jeff Davenport, Andy Krajewski, Corey Nelson and Forrest Campbell v. Greater Naples Fire Rescue District, Middle District Court, Civil Action No. 2:18-cv-00616-UA-MRM. The subject matter shall be confined to the pending litigation. I'm requesting the session be held Tuesday February 12, 2019 time specific of 6:00 pm. Commissioner Gerrity made a motion to have a closed-door attorney-client session February 12, 2019, time specific 6:00pm. Commissioner Cottiers seconded. Motion passed 5-0.



III. NEW BUSINESS

A. AIW - Impact Fee Purchase Authorization - Deputy Chief McLaughlin

Commissioner Gerrity made a motion to approve staff's recommendation to release \$264,278 from the Impact Budget for the purchase of equipment as specified. Commissioner Stedman seconded.

Commissioner Cottiers questioned if this purchase will bring everything up to date? Deputy Chief McLaughlin responded no we would be about 75% complete. Another \$148,000 or so is needed to bring all apparatus up to commonality. Approximate cost to just fix and replace non-working out dated parts would be around \$75,000. Commissioner Cottiers asked why not fix all now? Chief Schuldt responded this is what we feel comfortable using out of the Impact Budget.

Chairman Henning called the question. Motion passed 5-0.

B. Discharge of Fire Arms in Golden Gate Estates

Commissioner Gerrity presented the Board a handout on EPA Regulations on Outdoor Shooting Ranges. He requested the Board send the County Commission a letter supporting their efforts, for the State to provide regulations on back yard shooting ranges. Chairman Henning agreed and added it needs to be made a legislative priority to change the law. Commissioner Gerrity made a motion for staff to develop a letter (for the Chairman to sign), to the County Commissioners, expressing our support to persuade the State to regulate backyard shooting ranges. Seconded by Commissioner Stedman. Motion passed 5-0.

• Golden Gate Estates resident Milton L. asked how changes would affect local residents who currently follow the regulations and take proper precautions. Chairman Henning stated the law applies to everyone, the Board voted on seeking stricter regulations; not totally prohibiting shooting ranges.

C. Storm Shutter

Chief Schuldt present background information on firefighters being hampered while battling fires involving homes with hurricane storm shutter in place. The blocked windows and doors impede firefighting operations, limit the ability to adequately ventilate a structure, and prohibit safe evacuation of trapped victims. It is a life safety issue. Chief Schuldt requested authorization from the Board to bring this issue to the attention of County staff and request the Board of County Commissioner adopt a County-wide Ordinance outlining requirements for the use of storm shutters: deployment, duration, and removal. Chairman Henning stated at the recent County Board meeting the Board gave staff direction to reach out to the local Fire Chiefs and get recommendations and input on the storm shutter issues. The Board supported Chief Schuldt's position on storm shutters and agreed it's best to get ahead of the situation for life safety reasons.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

<u>Personnel</u> – The District received notice of resignation from one firefighter. Transition of an Apprentice to Full-time employment is underway. In anticipation of the pending retirement of an Administrative Assistant, staff has begun the process to advertise for a replacement. On January 28, 14 new firefighters completed their first phase of training. They are currently assigned to shift as the fourth person on apparatus working alongside a seasoned firefighter. Beginning February 11, they will be released to ride as the third person on apparatus.

Fire Hose Testing – January 21-25; 50,495' tested, approximately 2,950' failed pressure or visual inspections. Logistics was able to replace the majority of hose, with existing back stock. It is anticipated the purchase of approximately 1,000 feet of 2 ½" hose will be necessary.

Ground Ladder Testing – January 21-25; 1,116' tested, one 14' roof ladder failed. Ladder was replaced from existing back stock. No purchase anticipated.

<u>Strategic Planning</u> – Staff is preparing to conduct an annual update of the plan. Working with the District's strategic planning consultant, Fazio International, Staff is facilitating a number of teleconferences in preparation for a March visioning session with the Command Staff. Immokalee Fire District recently expressed interest in utilizing the same strategic planner.

<u>Legislation</u> - Staff continues to work with County and State legislative affairs representatives in preparation for presentation in Tallahassee. Senate Bill 72 has been assigned to five committees; however, it has not been placed on any agenda for hearing. The next potential committee hearing is scheduled for February 19 and travel arrangements have been secured in the event the Bill is placed on the agenda.

On February 23 staff attended the Greater Naples Chamber legislative update. The Bill was overviewed and identified as a county priority.

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On January 30 staff attended the Southwest Florida Pre-Delegation luncheon held in Fort Myers. The Bill was discussed with Senator Passidomo, Congressman Rooney's Chief of Staff, and the Greater Naples Chamber President seeking support. Also, agreeing to seek support from Congressman Diaz-Balart.

New Apparatus Push Back Ceremonies – Four ceremonies have been conducted at Stations 22, 23, 70, and 71. All new fire engines, battalion units and squad have been formally placed into service.

<u>Life Scan Physicals</u> – Phase two of the annual physical program was completed in January (civilian and Command staff personnel). Line personnel were completed in November. Staff has reached preliminary agreement with Life Scan to make physicals available to immediate family during next year's sessions.

<u>Collier County Community Assessment Safety Panel</u> – January 10; staff participated in this day-long workshop held at the Community Foundation along with other public safety members of the local community.

Immokalee Fire District Collaboration – January 11; at the request of Immokalee Chief Choate, the Chairman and I met he and their Chairwoman. General discussion took place about the future of the Immokalee Fire District and potential opportunities to collaborate with Greater Naples. They explained their current financial and organizational position and ideas they have for moving the district forward in a positive direction over the next several years.

<u>Fort Myers Beach Fire Commission Workshop</u> – January 14; I facilitated an 8-hour workshop for their Board of Fire Commissioners. Topics included commission roles and responsibilities, ethics, sunshine law, legislative requirements, policy implementation, fire chief roles and responsibilities, labor management, and collective bargaining for example.

<u>Labor Management</u> – Several meetings have been held with President Nelmes covering a wide range of topics to orient him on current affairs; collective bargaining, grievance procedures, on-going legal, safety review, safety committee, ALS program, and personnel issues. There has been open dialogue and a willingness by all parties to work cooperatively. The next formal bargaining session is set for February 13, 2019.

Alternative Funding – January 28; I was requested by the Lee County fire chiefs to participate in a teleconference to discuss a current effort by the group to develop a bill that would modify the current ad valorem taxing structure for special fire districts in Florida. Counties and municipalities, have alternative tools to bring tax equity and diversity into local revenue and expenditure decisions that are authorized under Florida's Constitutional home rule powers. These home rule revenue sources have been upheld by Florida's court system. Special districts lack significant home rule powers, and must rely on the Legislature to authorize revenue options by general law.

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It is being proposed Chapter 191 be updated to increase flexibility for revenue and budget decision facing independent fire and rescue districts. The proposed change to Chapter 191 will allow the use of special assessments and non-ad valorem assessments with more flexibility under certain circumstances. More specifically, the draft language will continue the referendum requirement for special assessments, but provides an exception if the district limits the amount of property tax revenue by one-half or 50% of the millage previously approved by the electors within the district.

Ochopee Fire Management Agreement – Staff has completed a draft timeline for the annexation of the MSTU including voter referendum. This will be presented to the Board during the February meeting. Staff additionally met with County staff to begin drafting a management agreement extension to coincide with the formal annexation in 2021. Chairman Henning and I met with the County Manager on February 7th to discuss future efforts to manage and merge the Ochopee service area into Greater Naples.

<u>Life Safety Fire Inspections</u> – Although building plan reviews are down slightly for the recent period, overall inspection activity has increased. Over recent weeks inspection wait time has increased to 3 to 4 days at times. Because of the increase and inability to conduct a significant number of Annual Fire Inspections (21 in December), Deputy Chief Hanson has been directed to conduct a cost analysis of adding additional fire inspectors for the sole purpose of conducting Annual inspection.

<u>Everglades Seafood Festival</u> – February 8-10 the District supported the annual festival in Everglades City. This was accomplished primarily with on-duty crews. This event brought an estimated 10,000 visitors to the City.

Knox Advisory Board – February 4-7; As part of the District's current partnership with Knox, Deputy Chief Hanson and I travelled to Phoenix, AZ to participate on the companies inaugural Advisory Board meeting. National fire service professionals from a variety of agencies including Underwriters Laboratory, National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, Maryland State Fire Marshals Office, and several fire rescue agencies gathered to participate in a forum to collaborate with industry on issues relating to "smarter building", first responder safety, and building security.

<u>Community Emergency Response Team</u> – District staff facilitated a CERT certification class for the VeronaWalk community, training approximately 35 members. The Winding Cypress community recently completed a similar class and are in process of registering with GNFD for sponsorship. The Naples Elks and Everglades City are also in the process of establishing programs.

<u>Fleet</u> – The new Brush truck chassis was recently delivered to Hall Mark in Ocala. Fabrication is well underway and delivery is anticipated in the next 30 days, or so.

The five new E-One apparatus have been in service for several weeks without any significant issues. There have been several minor warranty issues that have been addressed by Hall Mark in an exceptional manner. The front brakes on all apparatus have been changed out by the manufacturer to

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eliminate "chattering". This did not appear to be associated with E-One, rather the manufacturer of the brakes.

Ladder 72 remains out of service at Ten-8, the Florida Pierce dealer located in Bradenton. This is the second time the apparatus has been returned for issues with the ladder pully system and third time the for paint and corrosion issues.

Storm Shutter Awareness Campaign – Staff continues to develop a public awareness program. The County Commission has requested I present the issue during the February meeting. The issue was taken to the County Chiefs' Association where the membership would not support a position to request a local ordinance. Because of the group opposing the District's position, it was determined I would not present the item to the BCC, rather Chief Butcher.

GNFD Turnout Times >80 seconds



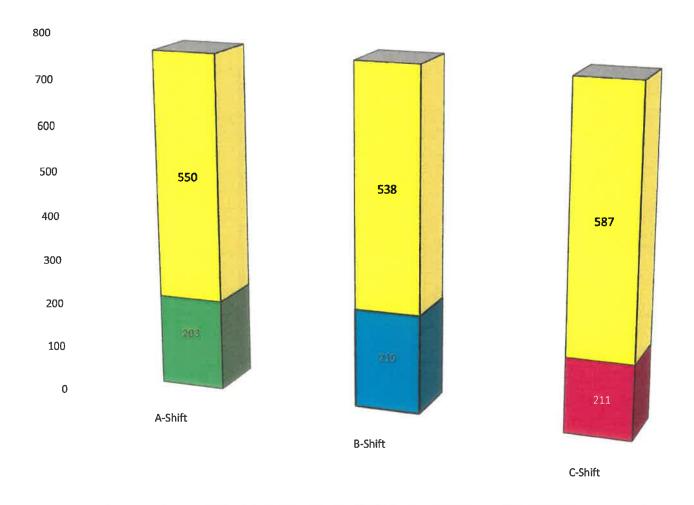

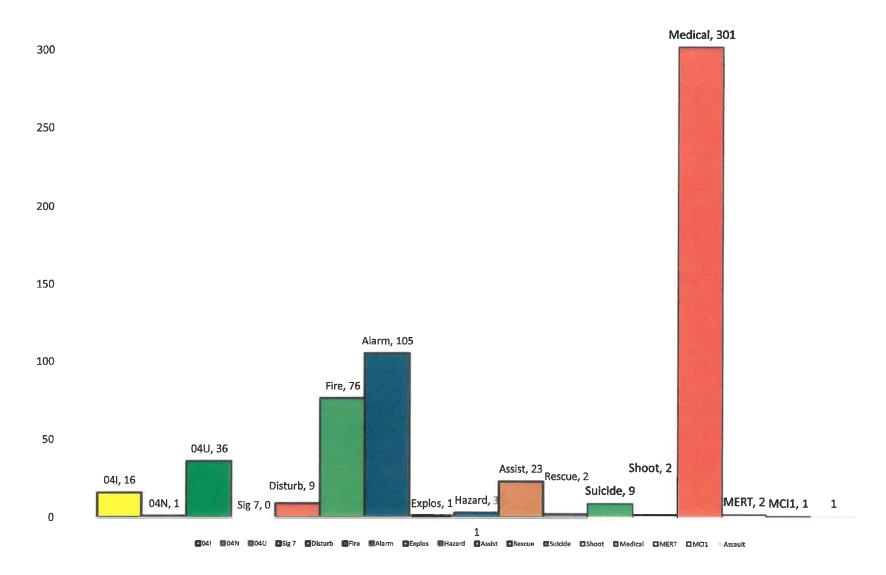

Under authority of the Agreement District will continue to provide services through September 23, 2019. Staff discussion have begun with County staff to extend the current agreement. The following timeline is presented for discussion on formally annexing the Ochopee dependent district.

As a result of the Board's action at the August 8, 2017 meeting to move forward with having a merger plan ready for voter referendum in 2020, staff began regular collaborative merger meetings with North Collier. During the December, 2017 Board meeting it was unanimous to focus more on collaboration than merger, and that regular collaborative joint staffing, training, fleet maintenance and Fire and Life safety focus meetings continued. ESTF progress reported at a standstill at the October 6th, 2018 meeting due to upcoming elections.

Most recently the Emergency Service Task Force requested a merger update of the Greater Naples (GNFD) and North Collier (NCFD) fire districts staff. A PowerPoint presentation took place during the December 2018 ESTF meeting. ESTF requested the same presentation be made to the respective Fire District Commissioners during the regular January, 2019 meetings.

ESTF discussed the relevance of continuing meetings in 2019 until such time the Boards reconfirm their commitment to the merger planning process. If confirmed by both Boards a merger target date of no later than 2022 has been suggested.

Deputy Chief Martin and Director DeAngelo presented at the North Collier Fire District January BOFC meeting the PowerPoint presentation. The North Collier Fire commissioners voted to move forward with merger efforts.

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) provides stakeholders across the whole community with the shared vocabulary, systems, and processes to successfully deliver the capabilities described in the NIMS helps prepare the nation for catastrophic disasters by uniting all incident personnel, from on-scene responders to individuals in Emergency Operations Centers (EOC) and senior officials, enabling them to meet challenges beyond the capacity of any single jurisdiction or organization.

This nationwide unity of effort hinges on a shared understanding of what NIMS implementation entails. The NIMS implementation Objectives provide the baseline for that understanding.

The NIMS Implementation Objectives reflect the concepts and principles contained in NIMS and aim to promote consistency in NIMS implementation across the Nation. The NIMS Implementation Objectives clarify the NIMS implementation requirements in FEMA preparedness grant Notices of Funding Opportunity. As recipients and subrecipients of Federal preparedness (non-disaster) grant awards, jurisdictions and organizations must achieve, or be actively working to achieve, all of the NIMS Implementation Objectives.

In addition to the Implementation Objectives, the following chart outlines a vision for each NIMS component and example indicators for each objective. The visions outline the intended end state of the activities under that component. The indicators are examples of characteristics that are frequently associated with jurisdictions and organizations that have achieved the objective. They are not requirements criteria, nor are the indicators intended as a checklist for achieving the objectives. The indicators are a tool to assist jurisdictions and organizations in meeting the new Implementation Objectives.

RESOLUTION TO FORMALLY ADOPT THE NATIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (NIMS)

WHEREAS, in Homeland Security Directive HSPD-5, the President directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System (NIMS), which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for Federal, State, local, and tribal governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prevent, prepare for, respond to and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size or complexity; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that all Federal, State, local and tribal emergency agencies and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management, and

WHEREAS, to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that Federal, State, local, and tribal organizations utilize standard terminology, standard organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters, and

WHEREAS, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management process, and

WHEREAS, the Incident Command System components of NIMS are already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout the County, including current emergency management training programs, and

WHEREAS, the National Commission of Terrorist Attacks (911 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District Board of Commissioners does hereby establish the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as the standard for incident management.
