ACTIVITIES REPORT

<u>Healthcare Renewal</u> – Working with Leading Edge, the District's Healthcare broker, a renewed healthcare plan was finalized. In order to hold an increase to 3.2% (@ \$200,000.00) it was necessary to change the 3 tier Rx card to 10/\$35/\$70.

- Medical Renew same medical plan with UHC but change the 3 tier Rx card to \$10/\$35/\$70 with a total premium increase of +3.2%. Keep Employee deductions that same as current.
- Dental Renew current Benefit plans with Sun Life.
- Vision Renew current Humana plans.
- Group Life, Supplemental Life, Short, and Long-Term Disability Renew current Benefits as is with The Standard. Life +24.4%; STD +74%; LTD +0%; Supplemental Life 0%.

<u>Firefighter Cancer Benefits</u> – The District successfully secured an insurance plan to meet the requirements recently enacted by the State of Florida. Staff evaluated numerous proposals and ultimately selected Star & Shield/Provident. Their premium costs were far less with an annual premium of \$22,368.68. Staff is next working with Star & Shield to offer a similar program for civilian employees.

<u>Fleet</u> – Ladder 21 returned from Ten-8 where it underwent numerous mechanical and corrosion repairs. Ladder 72 will be taken out of service for similar repairs in the near future. Both Battalion 20 and 70 units have been returned from REV where they underwent repairs due to physical damage. Boat 90 was recently out of service for routine PM and pumps repairs. Engine 24 was recently in an accident, remains in-service but will need to be taken out of service in the near future to facilitate repairs.

The Fuel Tenders were recently exercised as part of a training exercise to ensure the equipment is fully operational and operators are familiar with operating the equipment prior to a hurricane or wildfire deployment. Positive reports were received from Fleet mechanics and firefighters.



<u>Training</u> – Over the past several weeks crews have been participating in acquired structure training at the Old Copeland Prison on State Road 29. Similar training is scheduled for this location throughout September. Cities of Naples and Marco Island have also participated. Paramedic Credentialing Review training with Dr. Tober was also completed.

<u>Body Armor</u> – Division Chief Nelmes continues to serve as the subject matter expert and is working closely with the Training Section to prepare for in-service training that is expected to occur in the next several weeks. During his inventory of the equipment it was revealed that 17 back plates were the incorrect size. The manufacturer is in the process of exchanging the equipment and should be received within the next several weeks. Once received, training and program implementation will be scheduled. Staff anticipates training to begin October 1.

Promotions-

EMS Division Chief – Division Chief Kevin Nelmes begins his new assignment Monday, September 9 and assigned to the Training and Special Operations Section under the direction of Deputy Chief Low. This promotion was the result of a comprehensive interview process conducted by three EMS professionals from outside Collier County.

Lieutenant – Due to the promotion of Division Chief Nelmes a vacancy was created in the Operations Section. Interviews were conducted and Scott MacQuarrie was selected for promotion effective September 9.

<u>Personnel</u> - Two new Logistics Section employees have been hired. Mr. Brian Bower, will begin on September 9, and Scott Johnson on September 23. Mr. Johnson will fill a vacancy created by the departure of Ms. Pike, and Mr. Bower for a new position funded as part of the approved 2018-2019 Budget.

<u>Budget</u> – Staff continues to work on the 2019-2020 Budget proposal. As directed by the Board, a Capital Improvement schedule has been drafted and will be presented during the Budget Hearing. Additionally, a new Organizational Table has been developed which includes some changes at the Command level necessary to move the organization forward in a manner to best suit District needs. Some of the changes are the result of recommendations presented during this year's Strategic Planning update sessions.

<u>Union Grievances</u> – Since the Union's grievance presentations during the August 13 Commission meeting, Staff was informed the EMT reimbursement Grievance is not being moved to arbitration. The discipline grievance will be moving forward.

<u>FDOT Funding (Station 63)</u> – The District's legal team continues to work with the FDOT to develop an operating agreement. The District is waiting for a response from the Florida DOT.

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Stations 20, 72 Reroofing- August 20; Staff met with the awarded contractor to review the work schedule. Work will be started within 30 days in accordance with the contract. Metal roof color was selected with input from field personnel.

<u>Legislative</u> – Staff accompanied Chairman Henning to meetings with all local legislators to discuss the issue of Commissioner election process (at-large seats).

<u>FirstNet Public Safety Network</u> – August 23; Staff met with FirstNet representatives to discuss the District's options to move mobile communications over to their system. The FirstNet mission is to deploy, operate, maintain, and improve the first high-speed, nationwide wireless broadband network dedicated to public safety. This reliable, highly secure, interoperable, and innovative public safety communications platform will bring 21^{st} century tools to public safety agencies and first responders.

<u>Company Officer Mentoring Program</u> – The Training Section has developed a formal mentoring program to assist in preparing members to assume responsibilities of the company officer. The program was developed in accordance with recommendations provided in NFPA 1021, Standard for Fire Officer Qualifications. A pilot program is being implemented in September and will involve five selected mentors working with a single mentee.

<u>Hurricane Dorian</u> – August 26; Due to the developing storm track, District staff began monitoring storm conditions and forecasting. On August 28 District staff initiated daily planning sessions to prepare for any potential storm impacts. Meetings were conducted through the holiday weekend, sunsetting on September 3. Staff also participated in numerous county chiefs and emergency management meetings throughout the same period. In accordance with District Policy, a State of Emergency was authorized on August 30 and sunset on September 4.

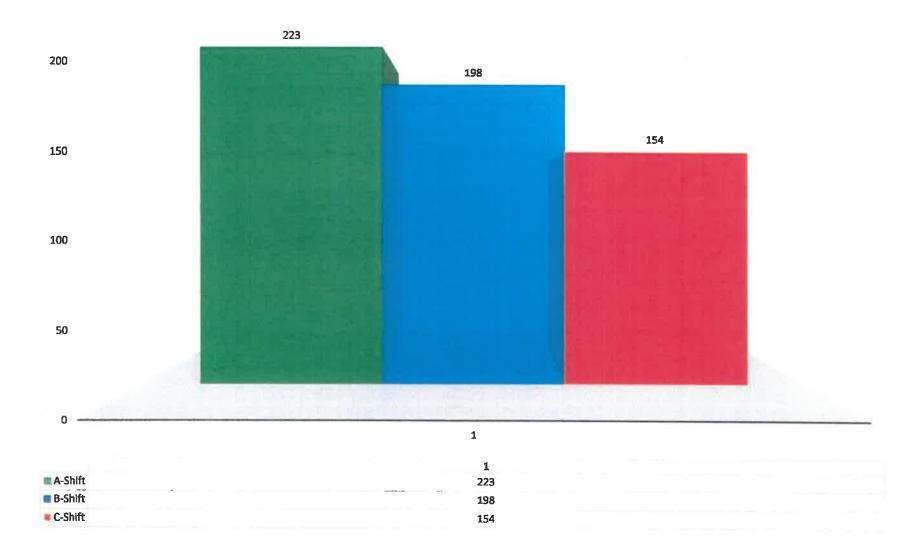

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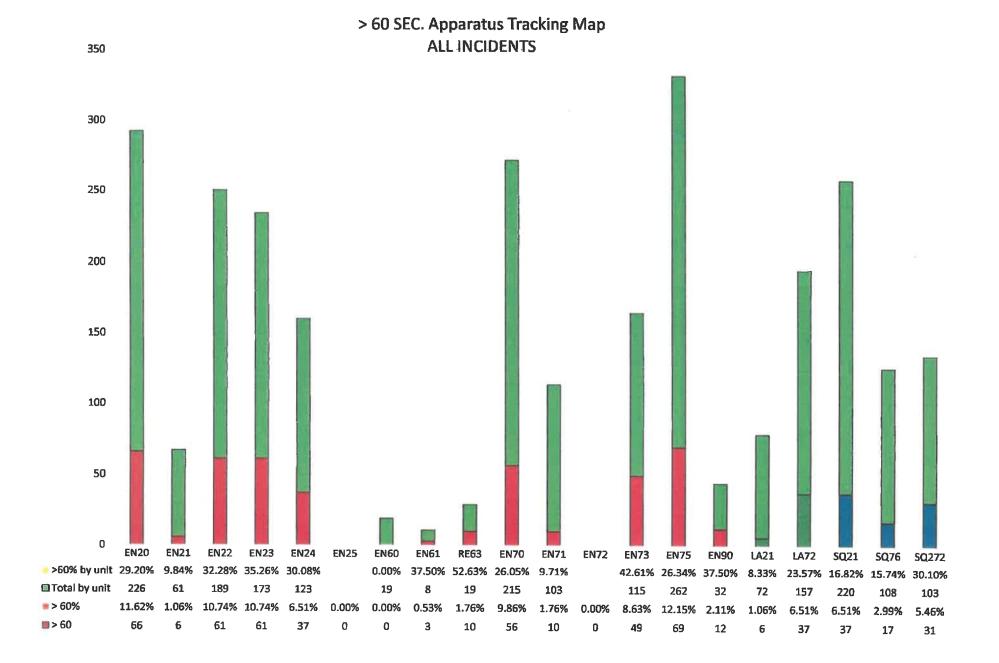
MONTHLY TREND MAP GREATER THAN 60 SECONDS ALL INCIDENTS

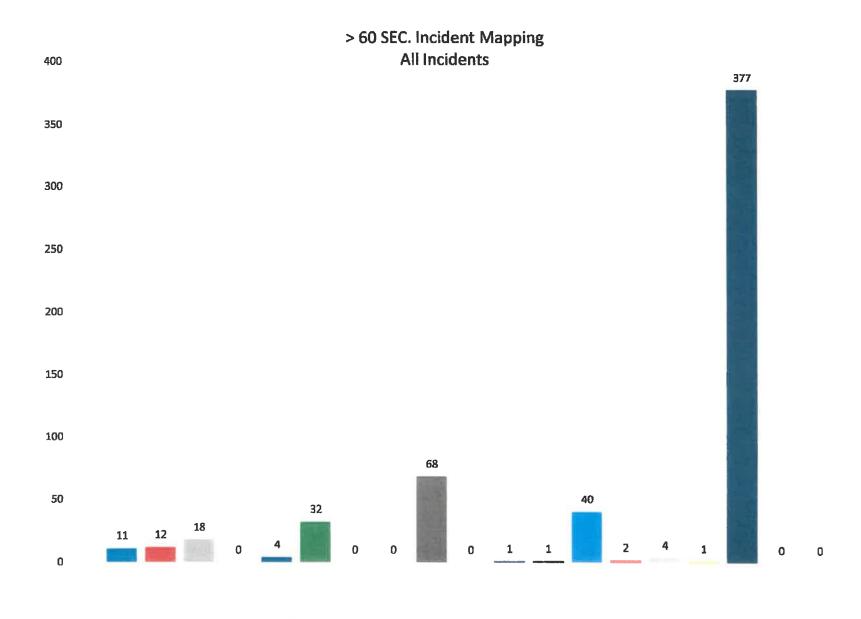

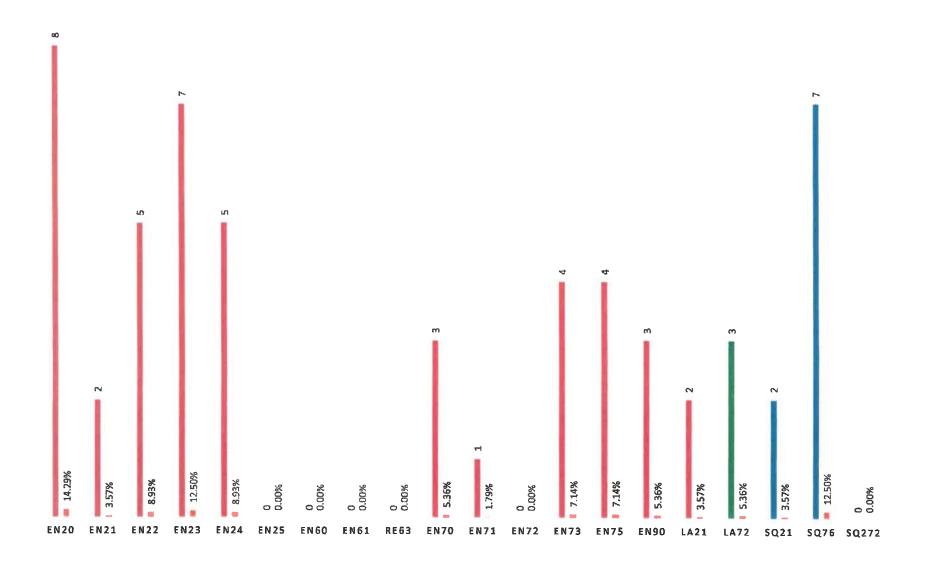


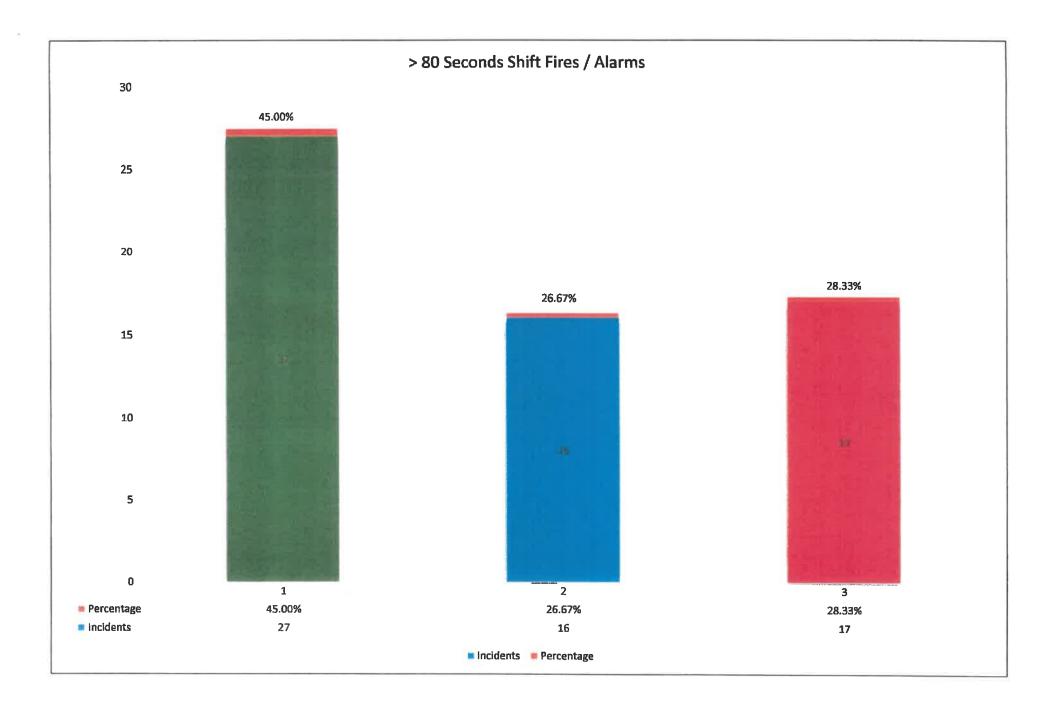




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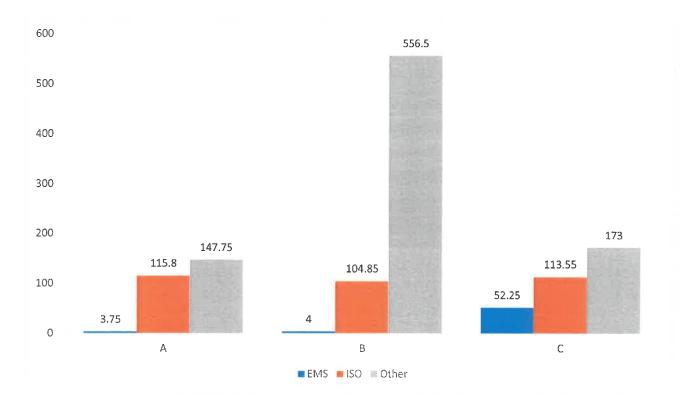
> 80 SECONDS APPARATUS CHART FIRE / FIRE ALARM

Background

The Greater Naples Fire Rescue District (GNFD) and the City of Marco Island Fire Rescue Department have been working closely to better serve our communities. The Greater Naples Fire Rescue Strategic Plan Section D states, capitalizing on opportunities for county-wide cooperation and operational efficiencies in Fire Rescue, Emergency Medical, and Life Safety Services.

In the spirit of cooperation and in concert with the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District Strategic Plan, staff has developed a new Services Agreement for Apparatus Management Services between the GNFD and the City of Marco Island.

The old contract provided the District a fixed amount of \$45,000 per year. This new contract will move to an hourly rate of \$80.00 per hour for a mechanic service, \$28.00 per hour for clerical services, and after hours an additional \$20.00 per hour. A shop charge of 5% will be added to the monthly statement for expendables based on total labor rate. This new contract will better track and recoup the cost of maintenance of the City of Marco apparatus repairs.

Funding Source/Financial Impact

Staff expects the income to remain at least the same.

Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of the Services Agreement for Fleet Management Services between the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District and the City of Marco Island.

Potential Motion

I move to adopt the Services Agreement between the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District and the City of Marco Island effective October 1, 2019.

SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MARCO ISLAND AND GREATER NAPLES FIRE RESCUE DISTRICT

This Services Agreement ("Agreement") is made as of the 1st day of October, 2019 ("Effective Date") between the CITY OF MARCO ISLAND, FLORIDA ("City"), a Florida municipality whose principal business address is 50 Bald Eagle Drive, Marco Island, Florida 34145, and GREATER NAPLES FIRE RESCUE DISTRICT ("District"), an independent special fire and rescue district of the State of Florida, whose principal business address is 14575 Collier Boulevard, Naples, Florida 34119, with each being referred to herein as a Party or collectively as the "Parties."

WHEREAS, Section 163.01, Florida Statutes, known as the "Florida Interlocal Cooperation Act of 1969," authorizes public agencies including the City and the District to jointly exercise any power, privilege, or authority which such agencies share in common and which each might exercise separately; and

WHEREAS, the District owns a maintenance facility ("Fleet") for the primary function of the repair and maintenance of the District's fire apparatus; and

WHEREAS, the District and the City wish to enter into an agreement in order to have the District provide repair and maintenance services to the City's fire apparatus; and

WHEREAS, the repair and maintenance of fire apparatus is specialized, involving certifications as specified by the National Fire Protection Association; and

WHEREAS, the District supports its employees in the pursuit of specialized training and certifications specific to the repair and maintenance of fire apparatus; and

WHEREAS, the District and the City have enjoyed a cooperative and supportive working relationship maintaining quality fire apparatus.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- TERM. The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the Effective Date, and shall remain in effect until September 30, 2020. This Agreement shall automatically renew for two (2) additional one (1) year terms commencing on October 1st of each year, unless this Agreement is terminated in accordance with Section 6 herein. The Parties shall meet annually during the term of this Agreement, but no later than May 30th of each year, to review the Services as defined in Paragraph 2 herein in order to forecast future Agreement considerations.
- 2. SERVICES. During the term of this Agreement, the District shall provide repair and maintenance services to the City's fire apparatus on an as-needed basis ("Services"). Services shall be performed by the District at the request of the City Manager or his/her designee. Twenty-four (24) hour emergency repair services shall be provided when feasible. Annual pump, aerial, and ground ladder testing of the apparatus will be the responsibility of the District and coordinated with input of the City. Costs for said testing and inspections shall be billed

separately to the City. The City shall not control the means and methods used by the District in performing the Services.

3. COMPENSATION. In consideration of the District's Services rendered hereunder, the City shall pay to the District an hourly rate of \$80.00 per hour for the Services provided by Fleet mechanics, as requested by the City and \$28.00 per hour for the Services provided by the Fleet Administrative Assistant... The City shall pay an additional \$20.00 per hour for Services performed in an emergency, after hours, on holidays, and/or on weekends. The City shall also pay a shop charge of 5% against the total labor for each job. The shop charge covers floor cleaners, paper goods, shop rags, small fasteners, uniforms, disposal of coolants, disposal of oil, disposal of transmission fluid, disposal of brake fluid, and used filters. The total amount of compensation under a term of this Agreement shall not exceed \$100,000.

The District shall provide the City with monthly invoices of the Services performed, which shall be accompanied by sufficient supporting documentation and contain sufficient detail to allow a proper audit of expenditures should the City require one to be performed. The date of the invoice shall not exceed 30 calendar days from the date of acceptance of the Services by the City. Services shall be billed in increments of one tenth (1/10) of an hour rounded off to the nearest one tenth (1/10) of an hour. Under no circumstances shall an invoice be submitted to the City in advance of delivery and acceptance of the Services, unless otherwise agreed to in advance in writing. All invoices shall reference the appropriate purchase order number, and the corresponding acceptance slip that was signed by an authorized representative of the City when the Services were delivered and accepted. Payment by the City shall be made within 30 days after receipt of the District's invoices.

4. **RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES.** During the term of this Agreement, the relationship of the Parties shall be that of the client and independent contractor. Nothing set forth in this Agreement shall be construed to create the relationship of employer and employee or principal and agent between the City and District. District shall not act or attempt to act or represent itself, directly or indirectly or by implication, as an employee of the City or in any manner assume or create, or attempt to assume or create, any obligation on behalf of or in the name of the City. Accordingly, District shall not attain, nor be entitled to, any rights or benefits of the City, nor any rights generally afforded City employees. District further understands that Florida Worker's Compensation benefits available to employees of the City are not available to District or to any employee or agent of District. All employees and subcontractors of District shall be considered to be, at all times, the sole employees or contractors of District, under its sole direction and not an employee, contractor or agent of the City.

By signing this Agreement, District warrants and represents to the City that District:

- a. Has all licenses and certifications required by applicable Law to perform the District's Services;
- b. Is experienced in all aspects of the Services required under this Agreement;
- c. Will act in the City's highest and best interest in performing the District's Services; and

The District acknowledges and agrees that the City is relying on these representations and covenants as a material inducement to enter into this Agreement.

5. **DISTRICT WARRANTIES.** District represents and warrants that District is free to enter into the terms of this Agreement and that District has no obligation to any third party or otherwise that are inconsistent with any of the provisions under this Agreement. This Section 5 shall survive termination of this Agreement. The warranty on any materials used in the repair and maintenance of the apparatus is the manufacturer's warranty and shall transfer to the City. The warranty on workmanship is limited to the correction of any defects in workmanship performed under this Agreement.

6. TERMINATION.

a. <u>Nonrenewal of Agreement</u>. In the event that either Party does not wish for this Agreement to automatically renew in accordance with Paragraph 1 of this Agreement, such Party shall provide written notice to the other Party no later than June 30th of such year of its intention to not renew this Agreement on September 30th of such year.

b. Termination For Convenience. This Agreement may be terminated by either Party for convenience upon seven (7) calendar days' written notice to the other Party. In the event of termination by the City, the District shall be paid for all authorized Services rendered as of the date of such termination. The amount payable to District in the event of such termination shall be the amount of the Services performed through the date of termination. In exchange for such payment, District shall turn over to City all work products which has been paid for by City. Under no circumstances shall the City make payment for Services that have not been performed.

- c. <u>Termination For Cause</u>. This Agreement may be terminated by either Party upon five (5) calendar Days' written notice to the other Party should such other Party fail to substantially perform in accordance with its material terms through no fault of the Party initiating the termination. In the event that City terminates the Agreement for cause, and it is subsequently determined by a court of competent jurisdiction that such termination was without cause, such termination shall thereupon be deemed a termination for convenience under paragraph (a) of this Section and the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section shall apply.
- 7. **INSURANCE.** The District shall furnish insurance certificates indicating satisfactory insurance coverage at its sole cost and expense of the type and in the minimum amounts stated below, maintained in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement. Such policies shall be issued by an insurer of recognized responsibility and rated no less than A-VI or better by the A.M. Best Company or similar insurance rating firm.

Such policies shall be primary and non-contributory with waiver of subrogation in favor of the City shall provide that the City will be given thirty (30) days advance written notice in the event of cancellation, termination, or modification, which materially restricts the coverage thereof.

Prior to the execution of this Agreement, the District shall provide the City with the insurance certificates and a copy of the policy endorsement naming the City, its employees, directors, officers, agents, independent contractors, successors, and assigns, and other authorized representatives as additional insureds to the extent of the contractual obligation assumed by the

District. The certificate shall show a waiver of subrogation and hold harmless agreement in favor of the City, its employees, directors, officers, agents, independent contractors, successors and assigns, and other authorized representatives.

- a. Comprehensive General Liability Insurance. Coverage Limits Required:
 - i. \$1,000,000 Each Occurrence
 - ii. \$1,000,000 Damage to Rented Premises (Each Occurrence)
 - iii. \$10,000 Medical Exp. (Any One Person)
 - iv. \$1,000,000 Personal & Advertising Injury
 - v. \$2,000,000 Products-Completed Operations Aggregate
 - vi. \$1,000,000 Liquor Liability (If Applicable) Coverage should be on an Occurrence form.
- b. Workers' Compensation Insurance. Statutory.
- c. <u>Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance</u>. Coverage Limits Required:
 i. \$1,000,000 Coverage should include hired and non-owned auto
- d. Umbrella. Coverage Limits Required:
 - i. Can be used to meet the limit requirement set forth above or per bid language.
- e. <u>Insurance Certificates</u>. The District should request wording on the insurance certificates, to be reflected in the "Description of Operations" section, as follows:

"The City of Marco Island is included as an Additional Insured in accordance with the policy provisions of the General Liability (ISO Form No. CG2010(11/85) or its equivalent) and Auto Liability policy. Insurance coverage is primary and non-contributory to any other insurance available to the City of Marco Island. Waiver of Subrogation applies to the General Liability, Auto Liability, and Workers' Compensation coverage. It is agreed that in no event shall these insurance companies have any right of recovery against the City of Marco Island, their officers, directors, and employees."

- f. <u>Subcontractors</u>. The District shall either require its subcontractors to procure and maintain the same types of insurance and in the same amounts specified above, or to insure the activities of its subcontractors in the District's own policies. All deviations and/or exceptions to these requirements are subject to the review and approval by the City's Risk Management Department.
- 8. **REPRESENTATIONS.** The Parties represent and warrant to each other that each of the recitals and provisions of this Agreement that relate to such Party are true, correct, and complete in every respect.
- 9. INDEMNIFICATION. To the extent permitted by law and as limited by and pursuant to the provisions of Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, which monetary limits shall apply regardless of whether they would apply in the absence of this provision, the Parties shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other Party, its officers, employees, and agents against any and all claims

and/or damages, including attorney's fees and costs of defense, which the other party or its officers, employees, or agents may incur as a result of any claim, demand, suit, or cause of action or proceeding of any kind or nature arising out of, relating to, or resulting from negligence. Nothing herein is intended to alter either Party's immunity provided in Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, or to otherwise impose liability on either Party when it would otherwise not be responsible. Neither Party shall be responsible to the other Party for any claim, demand, suit, or cause of action or proceeding of any kind or nature arising out of, relating to, or resulting from malfeasance, gross negligence, or illegal acts. This provision shall survive Termination of this Agreement.

10. NONASSIGNMENT. Neither this Agreement, or the rights or obligations thereunder, may be assigned or delegated in whole or in part.

11. MISCELLANEOUS.

a. <u>Notices</u>. All notices hereunder shall be given in writing and shall be sent by first class United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the Party at the following respective addresses, or at such other address as may be designated in writing by either Party to the other, and which shall be deemed delivered for all purposes hereunder upon deposit of same into the United States mail:

- b. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Parties agree to comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations that are now or may become applicable to the matters covered by this Agreement, regardless of the applicable jurisdiction.
- c. <u>Severability</u>. The Parties to this Agreement expressly agree that it is not their intention to violate any public policy, statutory, or common law rules, regulations, or decisions of any governmental or regulatory body. If any provision of this Agreement is judicially or administratively interpreted or construed as being in violation of any such policy, rule, regulation, or decision, the provision, sections, sentence, word, clause, or combination thereof causing such violation will be inoperative (and in lieu thereof there will be inserted such provision, section, sentence, word, clause, or combination thereof there with the intent of the Parties under this Agreement) and the remainder of this Agreement, as amended, will remain binding upon the Parties, unless the inoperative provision would cause enforcement of the remainder of this Agreement to be inequitable under the circumstances.

- d. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon the Parties and their respective successors, heirs and assigns. However, the Parties agree that nothing contained herein shall authorize the assignment of this Agreement or the delegation of any duties hereunder by either Party, unless previously set out in this Agreement, without the prior written consent of the other party.
- e. <u>Headings</u>. The section headings used in this Agreement are for reference and convenience only and shall not enter into the interpretation hereof.
- f. <u>Survival of Terms.</u> Termination or expiration of this Agreement for any reason shall not release either Party from any liabilities or obligations set forth in this Agreement which (a) the Parties have expressly agreed shall survive any such termination, or (b) remain to be performed and by their nature would be intended to be applicable following any such termination or expiration. Any liabilities which have accrued prior to termination pursuant to the insurance and/or indemnification obligations set forth below shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- g. <u>Waiver</u>. No delay or omission by either Party hereto, in the exercise of any right or remedy hereunder, shall impair such right or remedy or be construed to be a waiver thereof. Any waiver of any such right or remedy by any Party must be in writing and signed by the Party against which such waiver is sought. A waiver by either of the Parties hereto of any of the covenants to be performed by the other or any breach thereof shall not be construed to be a waiver of any succeeding breach thereof or any other covenant herein contained. All remedies provided for in this Agreement shall be cumulative and in addition to and not in lieu of any other remedies available to either Party at law, in equity or otherwise.
- h. <u>Force Majeure</u>. Non-performance of District or the City shall be excused to the extent that performance is rendered impossible or delayed by strike, fire, hurricane, flood, terrorism, governmental acts or orders or restrictions, or other similar reason where failure to perform is beyond the control of and not caused by the negligence of the non-performing Party ("Force Majeure"), provided that the non-conforming Party gives prompt notice of such conditions to the other Party and makes all reasonable efforts to perform.
- i. <u>Governing Laws</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by, construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Florida. The venue for any dispute arising from this Agreement shall be the Circuit Court of Collier County, Florida. The Parties voluntarily waive any right to trial by jury in the event of litigation between the Parties, which in any way arises out of this Agreement or the Services.
- j. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous written, and all previous or contemporaneous oral, negotiations, understandings, arrangements, and agreements. Unless expressly provided for otherwise in this Agreement, this Agreement may be amended only by a written amendment signed by both Parties hereto.

- k. Access to Records and Audit Clause. The Parties agrees to permit the other Party to examine all records which are, in any way, related to the Services provided and this Agreement, and the right to audit any books, documents and papers that were generated during the course of the administration of this Agreement. The Parties shall maintain the records, books, documents and papers associated with this Agreement in accordance with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. Upon either Party's request, such Party shall provide to the other Party copies of all public records related to this Agreement, at no cost to the other Party.
- 1. <u>Nonexclusive</u>. The Services to be provided by the District pursuant to this Agreement shall be nonexclusive and nothing herein shall preclude the City from engaging other firms to perform the same or similar Services for the benefit of the City within the City's sole and absolute discretion.

12. DISTRICT'S COMPLIANCE WITH FLORIDA PUBLIC RECORDS LAW.

Pursuant to Section 119.0701 of the Florida Statutes, if District meets the definition of "Contractor" as defined in Section 119.0701(1)(a), District shall:

- a) Keep and maintain public records that ordinarily and necessarily would be required by the City in order to perform the Services under this Agreement;
- b) Provide the public with access to public records on the same terms and conditions that the City would provide the records and at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, Fla. Stat. or as otherwise provided by law;
- c) Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law; and
- d) Meet all requirements for retaining public records and transfer to the City, at no City cost, all public records created, received, maintained and/or directly related to the performance of this Agreement that are in possession of District upon termination of this Agreement. Upon termination of this Agreement, District shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. All records stored electronically must be provided to the City in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the City.

If the District has questions regarding the application of chapter 119, Florida Statutes, to the District's duty to provide public records relating to this agreement, contact the custodian of public records, City Clerk Laura Litzan at (239) 389-5010, Llitzan@cityofinarcoisland.com, or 50 Bald Eagle Drive, Marco Island, Florida 34145.

For purposes of this Article, the term "public records" shall mean all documents, papers, letters, maps, books, tapes, photographs, films, sound recordings, data processing software, or other material, regardless of the physical form, characteristics, or means of transmission, made or received pursuant to law or ordinance or in connection with the transaction of official business of the City.

District's failure to comply with the public records disclosure requirement set forth in Section 119.0701 of the Florida Statutes shall be a breach of this Agreement.

In the event District does not comply with the public records disclosure requirement set forth in Section 119.0701 of the Florida Statutes, the City may, at the City's sole discretion, avail itself of the remedies set forth under this Agreement and available at law.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the District has signed and delivered this Agreement, and the City has caused this Agreement to be signed and delivered by its duly authorized officer or representative, all as of the Effective Date.

STATE OF EMERGENCY HURRICANE DORIAN

WHEREAS, Tom Henning, Chairman of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District is authorized pursuant to the authority establishing the fire rescue district known as the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District, as covered by Chapter 2014-240 Laws of Florida, to declare a Local State of Emergency due to the current and predicted path of Hurricane Dorian.

WHEREAS, The Governor of Florida, Ron DeSantis, has issued Executive order number 19-190 effective August 29,2019 declaring a State of Emergency in all 67 counties in the State of Florida.

WHEREAS, the declaration is a proactive measure to allow the District to be prepared for any unforeseen expenditures due to the storm and to use the districts' emergency operations plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the State of Emergency for the said District shall be effective August 29, 2019 and continue until such time it is declared otherwise.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution will be recorded in the next regularly scheduled Board meeting minutes of the Greater Naples Fire Rescue District.

STATE OF FLORIDA OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR EXECUTIVE ORDER NUMBER 19-190 (Emergency Management – Amendment of Executive Order 19-189 – Hurricane Dorian)

WHEREAS, on Wednesday, August 28, 2019, I issued Executive Order 19-189 declaring a state of emergency in 26 counties as a result of the severe threat posed by Hurricane Dorian; and

WHEREAS, as of 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, August 29, 2019, the National Hurricane Center reported Hurricane Dorian has strengthened in intensity, with maximum sustained winds of 85 mph, and is forecast to be a major hurricane as it travels over Atlantic waters; and

WHEREAS, the National Hurricane Center forecasts a potential landfall on Florida on Sunday or Monday with impacts possibly covering the entire peninsula and portions of the Northwest Florida; and

WHEREAS, there is an increasing risk of dangerous storm surge, rainfall, flooding, strong winds, hazardous seas, and the potential for isolated tornadic activity throughout Florida, now including the Gulf Coast and Northwest Florida counties; and

WHEREAS, the threat posed by Hurricane Dorian requires that timely precautions are taken to protect the communities, critical infrastructure, and general welfare of Florida.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RON DESANTIS, as Governor of Florida, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Article IV, Section 1(a) of the Florida Constitution and by the Florida Emergency Management Act, as amended, and all other applicable laws, promulgate the following Executive Order, to take immediate effect:

Section 1. The state of emergency declared in Executive Order 19-189 is amended to include all 67 counties.

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Section 2. Pursuant to section 161.111, Florida Statutes, I declare a shore erosion emergency in all coastal counties covered by Executive Order 19-189, as amended by this Executive Order. I authorize the Department of Environmental Protection to expend available funds, during this state of emergency, to respond to and alleviate coastal erosion caused by Hurricane Dorian.

Section 3. All actions taken by the Director of the Division of Emergency Management with respect to this emergency before the issuance of this Executive Order are ratified, he is directed to continue to execute the State's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and other response, recovery and mitigation plans necessary to cope with this emergency.

Section 4. Except as amended herein, Executive Order 19-189 is ratified and reaffirmed.

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STATE OF FLORIDA OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR EXECUTIVE ORDER NUMBER 19-189 (Emergency Management – Hurricane Dorian)

WHEREAS, as of 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 28, 2019, the National Hurricane Center reported that Tropical Storm Dorian has strengthened into a Category 1 Hurricane as it approached Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands;

WHEREAS, the National Hurricane Center reported Hurricane Dorian has maximum sustained winds of 75 miles per hour; and

WHEREAS, the National Hurricane Center predicts Hurricane Dorian will continue to strengthen as it moves over the Atlantic waters and will be a Major Hurricane prior to potential landfall; and

WHEREAS, the National Hurricane Center forecasts a potential landfall on Florida's peninsula on Sunday or Monday; and

WHEREAS, there is an increasing risk of dangerous storm surge, rainfall, flooding, strong winds, hazardous seas, and the potential for isolated tornadic activity for portions of Florida's Atlantic Coast; and

WHEREAS, the threat posed by Hurricane Dorian requires that timely precautions are taken to protect the communities, critical infrastructure, and general welfare of Florida; and

WHEREAS, as Governor, I am responsible to meet the dangers presented to Florida and its people by this emergency; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RON DESANTIS, as Governor of Florida, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Article IV, Section 1(a) of the Florida Constitution and by the Florida

Emergency Management Act, as amended, and all other applicable laws, promulgate the following Executive Order, to take immediate effect:

Section 1. Because of the foregoing conditions. I declare that a state of emergency exists in the following counties: Baker, Bradford, Brevard, Broward, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Glades, Hendry, Highlands, Indian River, Lake, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Nassau, Okeechobee, Orange, Osceola, Palm Beach, Putnam, Seminole, St. Johns, St. Lucie, Volusia, and Union.

Section 2. I designate the Director of the Division of Emergency Management ("Director") as the State Coordinating Officer for the duration of this emergency and direct him to execute the State's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and other response, recovery, and mitigation plans necessary to cope with the emergency. Pursuant to section 252.36(1)(a), Florida Statutes, I delegate to the State Coordinating Officer the authority to exercise those powers delineated in sections 252.36(5)-(10). Florida Statutes, which he shall exercise as needed to meet this emergency, subject to the limitations of section 252.33, Florida Statutes. In exercising the powers delegated by this Order, the State Coordinating Officer shall confer with the Governor to the fullest extent practicable. The State Coordinating Officer shall also have the authority to:

A. Invoke and administer the Emergency Management Assistance Compact ("EMAC") (sections 252.921-252.9335, Florida Statutes) and other compacts and agreements existing between the State of Florida and other states, and the further authority to coordinate the allocation of resources from such other states that are made available to Florida under such compacts and agreements so as best to meet this emergency.

B. Seek direct assistance and enter into agreements with any and all agencies of the United States Government as may be needed to meet the emergency.

C. Direct all state, regional and local governmental agencies, including law enforcement agencies, to identify personnel needed from those agencies to assist in meeting the

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response, recovery, and mitigation needs created by this emergency, and to place all such personnel under the direct command and coordination of the State Coordinating Officer to meet this emergency.

D. Direct the actions of any state agency as necessary to implement the Federal Emergency Management Agency's National Disaster Recovery Framework.

E. Designate additional Deputy State Coordinating Officers, as necessary.

F. Suspend the effect of any statute, rule, or order that would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay any mitigation, response, or recovery action necessary to cope with this emergency.

G. Enter orders as may be needed to implement any of the foregoing powers; however, the requirements of sections 252.46 and 120.54(4), Florida Statutes, do not apply to any such orders issued by the State Coordinating Officer; however, no such order shall remain in effect beyond the expiration of this Executive Order, to include any extension.

Section 3. I order the Adjutant General to activate the Florida National Guard, as needed, to deal with this emergency.

Section 4. I find that the special duties and responsibilities resting upon some State, regional, and local agencies and other governmental bodies in responding to the emergency may require them to suspend the application of the statutes, rules, ordinances, and orders they administer. Therefore, I issue the following authorizations:

A. Pursuant to section 252.36(5)(a), Florida Statutes, the Executive Office of the Governor may suspend all statutes and rules affecting budgeting to the extent necessary to provide budget authority for state agencies to cope with this emergency. The requirements of sections 252.46 and 120.54(4), Florida Statutes, do not apply to any such suspension issued by the

Executive Office of the Governor; however, no such suspension shall remain in effect beyond the expiration of this Executive Order, to include any extension.

B. Each State agency may suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business or the orders or rules of that agency, if strict compliance with the provisions of any such statute, order, or rule would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action in coping with the emergency. This includes, but is not limited to, the authority to suspend any and all statutes, rules, ordinances, or orders which affect leasing, printing, purchasing, travel, and the condition of employment and the compensation of employees. For the purposes of this Executive Order, "necessary action in coping with the emergency" means any emergency mitigation, response, or recovery action: (1) prescribed in the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan ("CEMP"): (2) directed by the Executive Office of the Governor; or (3) ordered by the State Coordinating Officer or Deputy State Coordinating Officer(s). The requirements of sections 252.46 and 120.54(4). Florida Statutes, shall not apply to any such suspension issued by a State agency; however, no such suspension shall remain in effect beyond the expiration of this Executive Order, to include any extensions of this Order.

C. In accordance with section 252.38, Florida Statutes, each political subdivision within the State of Florida may waive the procedures and formalities otherwise required of the political subdivision by law pertaining to:

1) Performance of public work and taking whatever prudent action is necessary to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the community;

2) Entering into contracts; however, political subdivisions are cautioned against entering into time and materials contracts without ceiling as defined by 2 CFR 200.318(j) or cost plus percentage contracts as defined by 2 CFR 200.323(d);

3) Incurring obligations;

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4) Employment of permanent and temporary workers;

5) Utilization of volunteer workers;

6) Rental of equipment;

7) Acquisition and distribution, with or without compensation, of supplies, materials, and facilities; and,

8) Appropriation and expenditure of public funds.

D. All agencies whose employees are certified by the American Red Cross as disaster service volunteers within the meaning of Section 110.120(3), Florida Statutes, may release any such employees for such service as requested by the Red Cross to meet this emergency.

E. The Secretary of the Florida Department of Transportation (DOT) may;

 Waive the collection of tolls and other fees and charges for the use of the Turnpike and other public highways, to the extent such waiver may be needed to provide emergency assistance or facilitate the evacuation of the affected counties:

2) Reverse the flow of traffic or close any and all roads, highways, and portions of highways as may be needed for the safe and efficient transportation of evacuees to those counties that the State Coordinating Officer may designate as destination counties for evacuees in this emergency;

3) Suspend enforcement of the registration requirements pursuant to sections 316.545(4) and 320.0715. Florida Statutes, for commercial motor vehicles that enter Florida to provide emergency services or supplies, to transport emergency equipment, supplies or personnel, or to transport FEMA mobile homes or office style mobile homes into or from Florida;

4) Waive the hours of service requirements for such vehicles;

5) Waive by special permit the warning signal requirements in the Utility Accommodations Manual to accommodate public utility companies from other jurisdictions which render assistance in restoring vital services; and,

6) Waive the size and weight restrictions for divisible loads on any vehicles transporting emergency equipment, services, supplies, and agricultural commodities and citrus as recommended by the Commissioner of Agriculture, allowing the establishment of alternate size and weight restrictions for all such vehicles for the duration of the emergency. The DOT shall issue permits and such vehicles shall be subject to such special conditions as the DOT may endorse on any such permits.

Nothing in this Executive Order shall be construed to allow any vehicle to exceed weight limits posted for bridges and like structures, or relieve any vehicle or the carrier, owner, or driver of any vehicle from compliance with any restrictions other than those specified in this Executive Order, or from any statute, rule, order, or other legal requirement not specifically waived or suspended herein or by supplemental order by the State Coordinating Officer;

F. The Executive Director of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) may:

1) Suspend enforcement of the registration requirements pursuant to sections 316.545(4) and 320.0715, Florida Statutes; for commercial motor vehicles that enter Florida to provide emergency services or supplies, to transport emergency equipment, supplies or personnel, or to transport FEMA mobile homes or office style mobile homes into or from Florida;

2) Waive the hours of service requirements for such vehicles;

3) Suspend the enforcement of the licensing and registration requirements under the International Fuel Tax Agreement (IFTA) pursuant to Chapter 207, Florida Statutes, and the International Registration Plan (IRP) pursuant to section 320.0715, Florida Statutes, for motor

carriers or drivers operating commercial motor vehicles that are properly registered in other jurisdictions and that are participating in emergency relief efforts through the transportation of equipment and supplies or providing other assistance in the form of emergency services;

4) Waive fees and charges for duplicate or replacement vessel registration certificates, vessel title certificates, vehicle license plates, vehicle registration certificates, vehicle tag certificates, vehicle title certificates, handicapped parking permits, replacement drivers' licenses, and replacement identification cards and to waive the additional fees or charges for the late renewal of or application for such licenses, certificates, and documents due to the effects of adverse weather conditions; and,

5) Defer administrative actions and waive fees imposed by law for driver license reinstatements, the late renewal or application for the above licenses, certificates, and documents, which were delayed or otherwise impacted due to the effects of adverse weather conditions, including in counties wherein mail services were interrupted, the DHSMV has closed offices, or any office of the County Tax Collector that acts on behalf of the DHSMV to process renewals has closed offices due to adverse weather conditions.

Recordkeeping and other applicable requirements for existing IFTA and IRP licensees and registrants are not affected by this order. The DHSMV shall promptly notify the State Coordinating Officer when the waiver is no longer necessary.

G. In accordance with section 465.0275, Florida Statutes, pharmacists may dispense up to a 30-day emergency prescription refill of maintenance medication to persons who reside in an area or county covered under this Executive Order and to emergency personnel who have been activated by their state and local agency but who do not reside in an area or county covered by this Executive Order.

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H. All State agencies responsible for the use of State buildings and facilities may close such buildings and facilities in those portions of the State affected by this emergency, to the extent to meet this emergency. I direct each State agency to report the closure of any State building or facility to the Secretary of the Department of Management Services. Under the authority contained in section 252.36, Florida Statutes, I direct each County to report the closure of any building or facility operated or maintained by the County or any political subdivision therein to the Secretary of the Department of Management Services. Furthermore, I direct the Secretary of the Department of Management Services for the Secretary of the Secretary of the Department of Management Services.

1) Maintain an accurate and up-to-date list of all such closures; and,

2) Provide that list daily to the State Coordinating Officer.

I. All State agencies may abrogate the time requirements, notice requirements, and deadlines for final action on applications for permits, licenses, rates, and other approvals under any statutes or rules under which such application are deemed to be approved unless disapproved in writing by specified deadlines, and all such time requirements that have not yet expired as of the date of this Executive Order are suspended and tolled to the extent needed to meet this emergency.

J. All State Agencies shall implement its Select Exempt Services (SES) Extraordinary Payment Plans and Career Service Regular Compensatory Leave Payment Plans for:

- All essential agency personnel who are required to work extraordinary hours when state-owned or state-operated facilities are closed in response to an emergency condition;
- All agency personnel who are assigned to the State Emergency Operations Center and are required to work extraordinary hours;

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 All agency personnel who are deployed throughout the state, as part of their employment, in response to an emergency condition and are required to work extraordinary hours.

K. All State agencies may waive the forty day time limit to issue a warrant pursuant to section 215.422(3)(b), Florida Statutes. This waiver applies to invoices and reimbursement requests that were received, inspected, and approved by the agency within forty days of the issuance of this Executive Order. This waiver applies to all invoices and reimbursements arising from the state of emergency. This waiver of section 215.422 (3)(b), Florida Statutes, and all waivers based upon this waiver shall expire sixty days following the issuance of this Executive Order, without extension.

L. Section 934.50, Florida Statutes, is waived for state and local agencies conducting emergency operations arising from the state of emergency for the limited purpose of capturing aerial evidence concerning the amount of damage sustained to private and public property: assisting in search, rescue, and recovery activities; and preventing imminent danger to life or serious damage to property.

Section 5. All public facilities, including elementary and secondary schools, community colleges, state universities, and other facilities owned or leased by the state, regional or local governments that are suitable for use as public shelters shall be made available at the request of the local emergency management agencies to ensure the proper reception and care of all evacuees. Under the authority contained in section 252.36, Florida Statutes, I direct the Superintendent of each public school district in the State of Florida to report the closure of any school within its district to the Commissioner of the Florida Department of Education. Furthermore, I direct the Commissioner of the Department of Education to:

A. Maintain an accurate and up-to-date list of all such closures; and,

B. Provide that list daily to the State Coordinating Officer.

Section 6. I find that the demands placed upon the funds appropriated to the agencies of the State of Florida and to local agencies are unreasonably great and may be inadequate to pay the costs of coping with this disaster. In accordance with section 252.37(2), Florida Statutes, I direct that sufficient funds be made available, as needed, by transferring and expending moneys appropriated for other purposes, moneys from unappropriated surplus funds, or from the Budget Stabilization Fund.

Section 7. All State agencies entering emergency final orders or other final actions in response to this emergency shall advise the State Coordinating Officer contemporaneously or as soon as practicable.

Section 8. Medical professionals and workers, social workers, and counselors with good and valid professional licenses issued by states other than the State of Florida may render such services in Florida during this emergency for persons affected by this emergency with the condition that such services be rendered to such persons free of charge, and with the further condition that such services be rendered under the auspices of the American Red Cross or the Florida Department of Health.

Section 9. Pursuant to section 501.160, Florida Statutes, it is unlawful and a violation of section 501.204 for a person to rent or sell, or offer to rent or sell, at an unconscionable price within the area for which the state of emergency is declared, any essential commodity including, but not limited to, supplies, services, provisions, or equipment that is necessary for consumption or use as a direct result of the emergency.

Section 10. Under the authority contained in sections 252.36(5)(a), (g), and (m), Florida Statutes, I direct that, for the purposes of this emergency, the term "essentials", as defined by section 252.359(2), Florida Statutes, shall be the same as, and no more expansive than, the term "commodity", as defined by section 501.160(1)(a), Florida Statutes (hereinafter referred to collectively or alternatively as "essential commodities"). Accordingly, any person who delivers essential commodities to a location in the area(s) declared to be under a state of emergency by this Executive Order, and when necessary to ensure that those commodities are made available to the public, may travel within evacuated areas and exceed curfews, provided the State Coordinating Officer determines, after consultation with the appropriate Emergency Support Function(s), that:

A. Law enforcement officials in the declared area(s) can provide adequate security to protect the essential commodities from theft;

B. The weight of a delivery vehicle will not jeopardize the structural integrity of any roadway or bridge located within the declared area;

C. Delivery vehicles will not negatively impact evacuation activities in the declared area(s); and,

D. Delivery vehicles will not negatively impact any response or recovery activities occurring within the declared area(s).

After consulting with the appropriate Emergency Support Function(s), and after consulting with local officials, the State Coordinating Officer may dictate the routes of ingress, egress, and movement within the declared area(s) that drivers must follow when delivering essential commodities.

Provided he or she is actually delivering medications, any person authorized to deliver medications under chapter 893, Florida Statutes, qualifies as a person delivering essential commodities.

In order to qualify as a person delivering essential commodities under this section, a person must be in the process of delivering essential commodities only. If an individual is transporting

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both essential and non-essential commodities, then this section shall not provide any authorization for that individual to enter into or move within the declared area(s).

Section 11. Consistent with Executive Order 80-29, nothing in this Order shall prevent local jurisdictions in any area not declared to be under a state of emergency by this Executive Order from taking prompt and necessary action to save lives and protect the property of their citizens, including the authority to compel and direct timely evacuation when necessary.

Section 12. I authorize the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to distribute funds pursuant to section 420.9073, Florida Statutes, to any county, municipality, or other political subdivision located within the area(s) declared to be under a state of emergency by this executive order. The authority of the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to distribute funds under this state of emergency shall expire six months from the expiration of this Order, to include any extensions of this Order.

Section 13. All actions taken by the Director of the Division of Emergency Management with respect to this emergency before the issuance of this Executive Order are ratified. This Executive Order shall expire sixty days from this date unless extended.
