Toy Drive Partnership

GNFD PARTNERS WITH THE SALVATION ARMY AND TOYS FOR TOTS

East Naples Fire Control & Rescue District began the "Toy Drive Command" program over 45 years ago. Retired Lt. Richard Gibbons established the program when the toys were distributed to families in the small East Naples community at a District picnic held at a fire station. Over the years, the program has grown to serve thousands of children countywide.

Traditionally, the District would distribute collection boxes throughout the District and the community would generously donate new toys and monetary donations for children in need. The District would also set up a "toy store" in a donated commercial property space, and personnel, along with many business owners, civic groups, and volunteers would sort toys and escort families through the store. In recent years, the bays at Station 73 were used for the "toy store".

As the District and the toy drive continued to grow and expand, this became a huge undertaking for the District to manage. In 2021, the District contacted The Salvation Army, who also runs a large toy drive with Toys for Tots, to see if we could consolidate our efforts. The District formed a committee under the leadership of Administrative Assistant Judy Schleiffer to coordinate the District's participation in the program.

The District is extremely pleased with how well this partnership worked and how many families were provided toys this Christmas. AA Judy Schleiffer did an excellent job working with the Director of Volunteers & Holiday and Senior Services Maria Ramos to provide toys for over 4,000 children in our community.

The District was able to distribute a holiday safety message to all the families served through a flyer provided by the Fire and Life Safety Section. Thank you to all personnel, businesses, and volunteers who so generously donated to this very worthy cause. We look forward to another great unified toy drive program in 2022!

His leadership has paved the road for any and all future development of the MERT program. Life Lessons Learned From A Palm Tree

Good People Will Flourish Like The Palm Tree. Ps 92:12 (MSG)

I am told by researchers that there are 2,600 species of palm trees, but in my Chaplains Corner I only have space to tell you about those that grow in our own neighborhood. Let me call to your attention to seven characteristics of the palm trees we see daily here in SWFL. First, there is its futuristic *uprightness*. Whether you see it on flat land or on ground with a prominent slope, our palms grow uniformly upright. The Bible has this in mind when it says, *They are upright as the palm trees*. Palm trees are mentioned in a positive way, more than 30 times in the Bible.

Second, there is its *overcoming power*. It grows, it even *flourishes* amid the times of drought in our dry season. Where most other trees would be survival challenged, our palm tree lifts its fronds in subtle victory. Sometimes we may wonder if there is too much emphasis today on improving environment, education, working conditions, and recreational amenities. It is all good; but there is something even better, and that is a change in ourselves. In the long view, it is not environment which changes us, but it is we who make our environment what it is (including our homes and yes, our places of employment and service, including GNFD.)

Third, the palm tree is peculiar in its *way of growth*. Unlike most other trees, instead of adding a new outer ring to the trunk every year, it grows outward by growing inwardly, from the center. Seventh, and finally I want to mark the *usefulness* of the palm tree. It is strong and yields fruit for the making of syrups, oils, juices, vinegars, milks, water and even medicine. It is good to remember that the older the tree, the sweeter its fruit and it still gives welcome shade. The question for each of us SWFL residents, are we good students of the lessons imparted to us by the palm-tree?
