SOME IDEAS ON CHANGE CHAPLAIN JACK STROM

EIMS NEWS PREPARING YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY Jim Augustine, MD



It is still unfortunate that we are in the middle of managing a lot of calls for illnesses like COVID, and service issues as staffing is tight. The good news is, we do not have the same threat of critical illness and death. And your community really appreciates your work.

This is going to be a busy fall and winter as we come out of pandemic times. And the stories are not going to be just about COVID. So what do you plan for?

Right now there are many more infectious illnesses passing through the community. There is a theme: people are back together, and in contact with each other after being quite "sterile" over the past 2+ years. They are passing lots of illnesses to each other. The GI bugs (like the nasty little cruise ship norovirus), lice, skin infections, meningitis (a bad infection), and mosquito illnesses are all at much higher rates than usual. To keep these out of your house: stay away from sick people, wash your hands, be careful the group-eating events (or bring your own food). To keep these out of our fire stations: don't come to work if you are sick.

There are a lot more respiratory illnesses. Not just COVID but all types of infections in sinuses, ears, throats, airways, and lungs. These are still nasty, and some people are getting admitted again for diseases other than COVID. PPE protects us from all of these, so please wear it to protect yourself, your family, and your fellow Department members. Influenza is here already, and it is very likely to be a big flu season. The month of October is a great time to get a flu shot, and I would recommend it to all of you. The influenza vaccination this year protects from four strains (so it is a quadrivalent vaccine), and this will be a good year to be protected.

Then there is the latest variant of COVID. The symptoms of Omicron are different. Very few people have loss of taste and smell. Sore throat, runny nose, fatigue, fever, headache and back pain seem to be the most common symptoms in our healthy members who get it. Omicron is clearly less deadly, but the extraordinary increase in the number of individuals getting the disease mean the ED's are still busy, and unvaccinated persons are very much at risk for hospitalization, and death. Breakthrough cases are occurring even in those vaccinated and boosted, but those individuals are at much less risk for serious disease. Some have speculated that the Omicron variant is so infectious that eventually everyone is going to get it.

Vaccines and boosters for COVID are still very much recommended, and safe. There are still plenty of the primary vaccines for those that have not been vaccinated, at all ages down to 6 months. The recent news is the release of an improved bivalent booster that covers the Omicron variant more effectively. It is for patients that have already received the primary series of vaccines. Anyone down to age 12 can get that booster. Again, October is a good month to get vaccinated, and protection will be present through the holiday seasons. It can be given at the same time as the influenza vaccine, but in a different jab and in a different arm. Getting both together is likely to make you feel washed out for about 24-36 hours, but it provides lifesaving protections and reduces the risks of being in an ambulance, or in a hospital bed.

In this upcoming busy season, there is the hope that we can return to normal incidence of diseases that will not continue to interfere with life and community. Here are key elements:

- Most important to our community and Department is that personnel should not be in public, or come to work, if ill
- Vaccines are providing great protection from serious disease. Both COVID and flu vaccines will be useful in the coming months
- Tests are no longer free to get in the mail from the Federal government, but we have access to testing that will let us know quickly if COVID is present
- We have treatments that reduce the severity of COVID disease. That includes monoclonal antibodies, prophylactic monoclonal antibodies, and oral treatments. If you are sick with COVID, get seen
- Masks continue to be effective in preventing spread, and they are available
- The health care system is still functional

Be prepared. Use your PPE. Stay well! Keep your family healthy!

Fleet Mechanic John Luppy recertified in some of his ASE (Automotive Service Excellence) Certification, these have to be re-tested every five years to maintain. Lead Technician Jamie Popiol received factory training on the Pierce Fire Apparatus at their yearly training center. Lead Technician Robert Taub also received his ASE Certification, as well as finishing his requirements to be an EVT Master Certified Ambulance Technician. Lead Technician Mark Records also recertified his ASE Certification to maintain his areas of qualifications.
